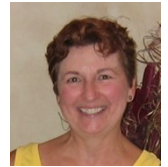






# Advocates for Children

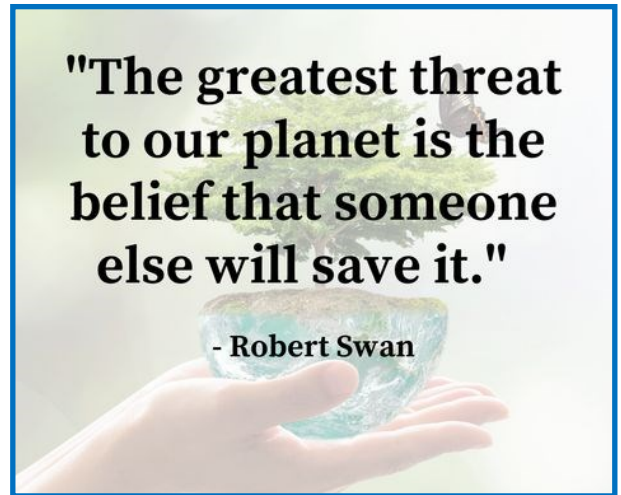

**REASON FOR MOTION:** The Health and Wellness Committee understands that foster children face enduring hardship from being placed in new foster homes, acclimating to their new surroundings, going to a new school and leaving what they knew behind. Foster children move around frequently. As a result, they fall behind in school. These frequent moves mean they are not performing at their grade level and many times have large absence periods. Academic records do not always follow the child, so they are not always placed in a grade-appropriate environment, nor do they provide resources to catch up. Rose Again Foundation partners with local community organizations that provide private tutoring. Through donations they are able to pay for private tutoring, thus enabling the children to get caught up academically, and providing the opportunity for them to excel.

**The SAFE Family Justice Center** in Temecula is building bookcases that will hold more than 750 books. They need funds to purchase books to fill the shelves. For more than 25 years, SAFE's mission and services are to provide immediate needs and reach out to victims of extreme violence with shelter, basic needs, safety planning, counseling, and education. Currently, the SAFE Family Justice Center in Temecula is building bookcases that will hold more than 750 books. They need funds to purchase books to fill the shelves.

**COST: \$1,500**

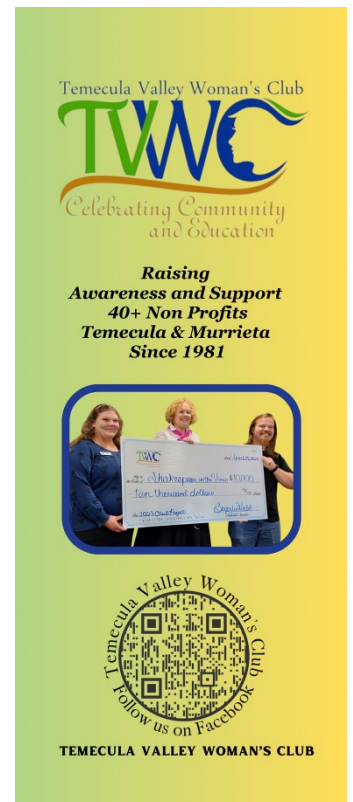

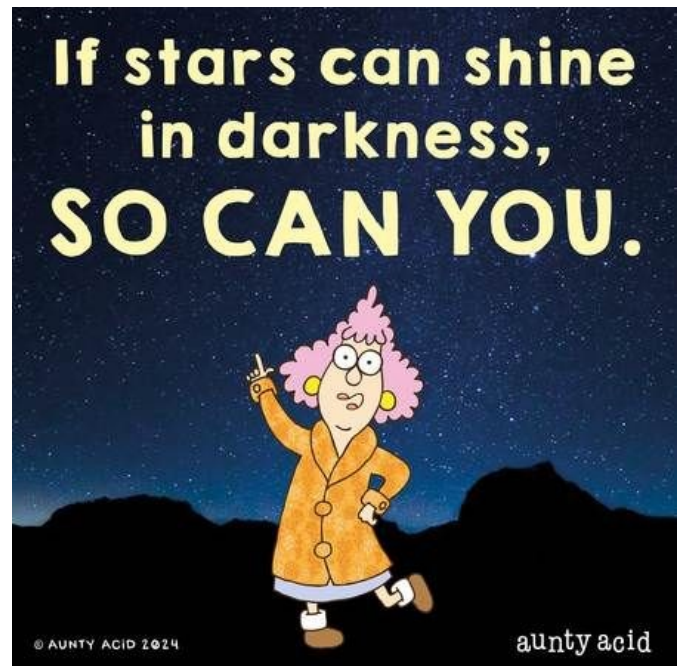

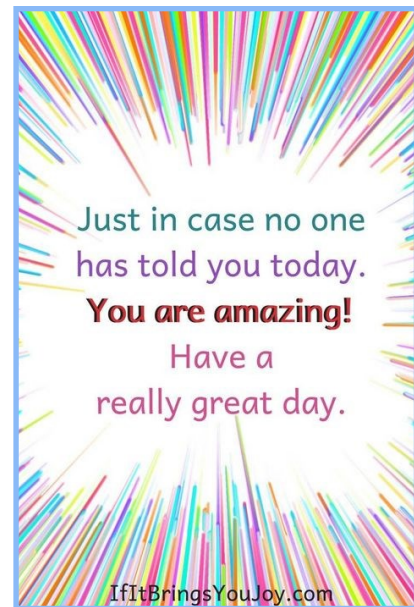
